Zoom Meeting No 8



This month our speaker was Mr. Andy Chan Sales Associate at Oceana Parc. an independent living retirement community in White Rock. Andy spoke to us about the challenges of operating in these difficult times and told us about the demographics of White Rock. He described how many functions at Oceana Parc are able to continue with COVID-related protocols including recreational facilities. Our Probus Club member Vince Holmes, who lives at Oceana Parc said Andy had given an honest representation of life

at the facility. Andy also pointed out that the retirement community in the area was largely middle to upper middle income, and enjoyed the amenities such as restaurants and performing arts available in our community. Most rely on traditional media for information and specifically newspapers, television and radio but that there is some current migration towards the internet during this pandemic. Andy spoke of the advantages of independent retirement living including daily contact with people as opposed to living alone. He said there is always help available if you need it. Andy answered questions from members about costs saying one-bedroom units are available for as low as \$3,000 per month. A three bedroom unit can cost \$12,000 per month. He did not provide figures for occupancy but said there is a waiting list for units with a view of the ocean.

Our Probus Club was able to hold one meeting at Oceana Parc just before the COVID pandemic happened this spring. President Brian Sullivan said our club

maintains a good relationship with Oceana Parc and intends to return to holding meetings there when the pandemic is over. Brian did point out that we do not endorse any facility.



Our January speaker is Dick Drew, retired broadcaster and author who has written about Canadian Achievers. Dick has written books including The Canadian Achievers which contains interviews with hundreds of successful people in business and entertainment.



Our February speaker is Glenda Standeven who will speak about what men don't like to talk about – prostate cancer. She'll do it in a whimsical way but her message is serious.



Our March speaker will be Baden Smith (Percy's son) who is Director of Information Security for Save On Foods. Baden will have a Power Point presentation regarding internet security and advice on how to avoid being defrauded.



Our April speaker is Mark Bulgutch co-author with Peter Mansbridge of a new book titled "Extraordinary Canadians" He is an outstanding CBC producer who has been responsible for major broadcasts for many years including eight Olympics and major events.

I was born in Liverpool England and moved to Toronto when I was 6 years old. Went to Ryerson University and studied Chemical Engineering with a major in food science. After graduation I went to work for Canada Packers (chemicals div.) (Maple foods) in the product development lab. We manufactured soap products and raw materials that could be formulated into finished product such as dish detergents, shampoos, etc. In 1973 the company asked me to move to Vancouver as a sales rep in order to answer customer's technical questions instead of sending messages back and forth across the country. When I first moved here it never stopped raining but by the end of summer I told my boss not to ever think about moving me back to Toronto. I lived down at Kits beach.

I met Linda (1/2 Newfie-1/2 Nova Scotia) late that year and got married the next year. We now have had two children and three grandchildren.


After about 4 years as a sales rep I wanted a change and so started to work at a detergent manufacturing company called Savolite as plant manager/sales rep/lab mgr./purchaser and spent the next eleven years there. I was then approach by one of our suppliers to go into business as his partner as his wife wanted to retire. Everything went well until my partner had heart attack which took him out of the day to day business for about a year. Fortunately during this time we were approached by two men who worked in detergent sales and we started a partnership in a company call Protonics Chemical Corp. After about a year my original partner was bought out and the three of us started to grow the business with me overseeing the plant, office and product development with the other two doing sales. We sold detergents to restaurants, nursing homes and truck washes. Our other partner left after seven years so we were down to two owners and wanted give back to our long term staff so awarded them the shares from our partner. We got to be known in the industry and started to get businesses that wanted us to make products under private label. One customer was Mountain Equipment Co-op and after a few trial samples we got to manufacture under their label "Biocycle" which was a bicycle chain cleaner. We thought it was a small item at first but over the years we ended up selling thousands of cases a year.

My last partner was younger than me and had children in their teen's so wanted to spend more time with them so we decide to sell a large portion of the business but stay on as management. I lasted about two years and decide to retire four years ago. The company started with three people and ended up with 24 wonderful staff (not just employees). Unfortunately the company has not done well with the hospitality industry being shut down but it is still operating.

Now retired I have been doing a lot of golfing, skiing and curling along with house projects. Currently editor of the Probus newsletter.
